Established in 1978. In 2020 the area was declared a National Park & Preserve

The New River Gorge Bridge opened October 22, 1977; The bridge cut the vehicle travel time from one side of the gorge to the other from about 45 minutes to 45 seconds.

Since 1980, Bridge Day has been the 3rd Saturday in October.

The New River may be one of the oldest river systems in the world. (Teays River system)

The New River feeds into the Gauley to become the Kanawha where it eventually joins with the Ohio River.


Summersville Dam and Lake
